
POST-GRADUATION MEDICAL INSURANCE

Have you thought about post-graduation medical insurance requirements? It's now the law that you have medical coverage and as you leave CCHS your eligibility for student insurance may cease. Good news: Graduation is a life mile marker that triggers a "Special Enrollment Period." A special enrollment period allows a 60-day window for new graduates to sign up for medical coverage in the marketplace, even though it's not a typical open enrollment period.

Graduating students who don't have insurance through a job, a spouse/partner or a new educational opportunity have two opportunities:

- So Find a plan on the marketplace at www.healthcare.gov.
- Stay on your parent's plan if you're 26 or under.

What you cannot do is simply "ride it out" hoping for no accidents or illness. So, unless you're covered by your parents' plan or a spouse's/partner's plan, you need to either have a job that provides coverage, or select a plan from the Marketplace within two months of graduating. EMERGENCY NOTIFICATION TEST RESULTS

The College conducted a test of its emergency response communication system on April 9 and all went according to plan. Based on responses to the survey, 98% indicated they received the notification. General feedback from respondents indicated that the test was a success. The primary feedback received was inquiries on how to receive a text message... the instructions are below:

The process is simple to initiate text messaging: 1) Log on to Sonis-Web using your existing e-mail & PIN; 2) Click on "Update Bio" link at top of page; 3) Enter your cell phone number & your provider; 4) Check the "Text Me" Flag; 5) Click "Submit" at bottom of page. *While there, check to make sure all of your phone numbers, as well as well as your address, are correct.*

Please remember that the system is designed to continuously call all numbers, up to four attempts, until answered. This is to ensure that in the event of an actual emergency, you will receive the notification. The College conducts an emergency notification test every fall and spring semester. The next test is scheduled for **November 12**. COMPLIANCE CORNER - No Passing Zones




Carolinas Medical Center has initiated "No Passing Zones" on some units. These yellow and black pennantshaped signs have new meaning in the hospital. Some pennants at CMC have cues like "Every Patient, Every Time, Everyone" as a reminder to all to address patient needs quickly. Because the sound of call bells or visitors approaching the nurse's station is a common occurrence this initiative is designed to avoid team members wrongly assuming that someone else will respond.

Endorsed by the Hospital Quality Institute, the premise is that EVERYONE is responsible for addressing a patient's need, every time. (Even non-clinical employees on clinical units for any reason are required to respond or seek appropriate help.) Let's all do our part to change the culture and to help improve patient and visitor satisfaction.

CULTURAL & RELIGIOUS DIVERSITY: Understanding and respecting others' beliefs.

Charlotte's increasing diversity is reflected in the patients we serve. A culturally competent provider knows that religious beliefs can bring comfort to patients dealing with illness, pain and stress. Listed below are some of the current month's days of cultural and spiritual significance.

May 1 - Beltane [also called Beltain or May Day] – Wicca. Celebration of the sacred marriage of the divine forces—and the conception of the sun-child—that are the basis of all creation.

May 2 - Twelfth Day of Ridván – Bahá'í. The conclusion of the Bahá'í festival that commemorates Baha'u'llah's exile in Baghdad leading up to his declaration as the one announced by the Báb in 1863 C.E. *Birthday of Gurū Arjan Dev – Sikhism*. Gurū Arjan Dev (1563 – 1606 C.E.) was the fifth of the Sikh Gurūs.

May 4 - Ghambar Maidyozarem ends – Zoroastrianism. The end of the celebration of the creation of the sky and the harvesting of the winter crops. *Visakha Puja [Buddha Day] – Buddhism*. Celebrated on the full moon of the sixth lunar month, this is a triple commemoration of the historical Buddha's birth, enlightenment, and death and entrance into nirvana.

May 7 - Lag B'Omer – Judaism. The 33rd day in the counting of the period between Pesach [Passover] and Shavuot [the giving of the Law]; the festival begins at sundown. National Day of Prayer – Multi-faith, USA.

May 14 - Ascension Day – Christianity (Western churches). The anniversary of Jesus' ascension into heaven, celebrated 40 days after Easter. In the Roman Catholic Church, this day is celebrated on Sunday, May 17th. Laylat al-Isra' wa al-Mi'rāj – Islam. The commemoration of the Prophet Muhammad's night journey from Mecca to Jerusalem, his ascent into heaven and return on the same night, and his receipt of Allah's commandment of the five compulsory daily prayers. This celebration begins at dusk.

May 15 - Restoration of the Aaronic priesthood – Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. Marking the restoration of this order by John the Baptist and conferred upon the Prophet Joseph Smith and Oliver Cowdery on this date in 1829 C.E.

May 17 - 'Azamat – Bahá'í. The beginning of the fourth month of the Bahá'í year, 'Azamat means "grandeur." Yom Yerushalayim – Judaism. A celebration of the city of Jerusalem.

May 20 - Ascension Day – Christianity (Eastern churches). The anniversary of Jesus' ascension into heaven, celebrated 40 days after Easter.

May 23 - Shavuot [Feast of Weeks] – Judaism. A two-day festival, beginning at sundown, that celebrates the harvest of first fruits and the giving of the Law (or Torah) to Moses at Mt. Sinai. The name Shavuot derives from the Hebrew words for "seven" and "week," because it marks seven weeks following Pesach or Passover. *Declaration of the Báb* – *Bahá'í*. The celebration of the day in 1844 C.E. when he announced his identity as the Gate or herald of the new age in Shiraz, Persia (modern-day Iran). *Birthday of Gurū Amar Das* – *Sikhism.* Gurū Amar Das (1479 – 1574 C.E.) was the third of the Sikh Gurūs.

May 24 - Pentecost Sunday – Christianity (Western churches). A celebration of the Holy Spirit's descent upon the Apostles following Jesus' ascension into heaven, Pentecost [which derives from the Latin for "fifty," because it occurred 50 days after Easter] is often known as "the birthday of the Christian Church."

May 29 - Ascension of Baha'u'llah – Bahá'í. The anniversary of the death of the founder of the Bahá'í faith in Palestine in 1892 C.E. Adherents suspend work on this day.

May 31 - Pentecost Sunday – Christianity (Eastern churches). A celebration of the Holy Spirit's descent upon the Apostles following Jesus' ascension into heaven, Pentecost [which derives from the Latin for "fifty," because it occurred 50 days after Easter] is often known as "the birthday of the Christian Church." *Trinity Sunday – Christianity (Western churches)*. Marking the celebration of God manifested in three Persons: as Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. *Laylat al-Bara'at or Nisf Sha'bān – Islam*. According to Muslim tradition, Allah approaches the earth on this night (the middle day of the eighth month in the Islamic calendar) to call humanity to repentance and grant forgiveness of sins.

MENTAL HEALTH FIRST AID (MHFA): IT'S TIME HAS COME

Mental Health challenges are a fact of modern life.

- One in four adults (62 million Americans) experience mental illness in a given year. One in 17 (13.6 million) live with a serious mental illness such as schizophrenia, bipolar disorder.
- Eighteen percent of American adults (42 million) live with anxiety disorders, such as panic disorder, obsessive-compulsive disorder (OCD), posttraumatic stress disorder (PTSD).
- So Forty-six percent of homeless adults in shelters live with serious mental illness and/or drug dependence.
- Half of all chronic mental illness begins by the age of 14; three-quarters by age 24. Despite effective treatment, there are long delays - sometimes decades - before people get help. Sources: http://www2.nami.org/factsheets/mentalillness_factsheet.pdf).

Everyone acknowledges the problem; few know what to do. Carolinas HealthCare System looked at the community and itself, and responded, "We do know what to do!" Thus, Mental Health First Aid - a national curriculum for the lay person - was adopted. In April, CCHS voted to be the first college in the region to require all teammates and first semester students to complete MHFA. The long-term impact will be profound, and CCHS is proud to be on the cutting edge. Effective fall 2015, new students will attend the 8-hour interactive training during their first semester, with all costs covered. Sessions will be available for continuing students and teammates as well.

STUDENT NURSES ASSOCIATION (SNA)



AFTER THE SMOKE CLEARED...

After the smoke cleared and excitement diminished following the Code Red on April 15, several college representatives met with CHS teammates and others involved in the incident to review the process and explore what could be improved. While our initial response was excellent – we evacuated the building in less than two and a half minutes – that was not all that went well. We discovered that we were very prepared to handle an unexpected emergency situation and that our students and teammates responded with great professional-ism. Our partners at the Charlotte Fire Department and our building managers were engaged and responded in a timely manner and the situation was resolved quickly. However, we discovered an opportunity to improve communication between those in the building and those who evacuated. We also found an opportunity to improve the coordination between Carolinas HealthCare System and the College, particularly in terms of specific fire protocols. Congratulations to everyone who managed the incident.
