Carolinas HealthCare System celebrates Breast Health Awareness the entire month of October to encourage mammograms and other preventive screenings. The College will celebrate on **October 9**. Breast cancer is the second most common form of cancer in women. The key to beating breast cancer is early detection. Women should perform monthly self-breast exams, have regular clinical breast examinations by a trained medical professional, and schedule mammograms as recommended by their provider. CHS teammates can use "Time Out for



Prevention" to schedule all recommended preventive care and screenings, including mammograms. Preventive screenings can find conditions earlier, when they are easier to treat.

COMPLIANCE UPDATE - Intravenous Lines

This month's Compliance Corner deals with a recent Practice Change Alert regarding intravenous lines. Curos Caps are port protectors used on any patient with a central line to cover the hubs used for infusion via syringe or via IV tubing. In addition, all un-accessed IV tubing ports, needleless connectors and peripheral IV sites must have Curos Caps if not accessed.



The policy was changed to address accessing the hubs for injection or infu-

sion. If the alcohol port protector, or Curos Cap, has been in place for greater than or equal to a minute, no additional scrubbing of the hub is needed prior to accessing the hub or line. If not, vigorous scrubbing of the hub for at least 15 seconds with the appropriate alcohol or chlorhexidine/alcohol protocol is necessary and must be made to air dry before accessing the line. This change ensures all are following the manufacturer's guidelines for Curos alcohol port protectors, and coincides with Standards of Practice for Infusion Therapy.

BCLS for the Healthcare Provider October 11, 8 AM to noon. Cost \$50. Textbook not included. This course is designed for professional rescuers or students required to have professional rescuer certification for their healthcare program of study. The course provides information on adult and pediatric CPR, two-rescuer scenarios, use of the bagvalve mask, foreign-body airway obstruction (conscious and unconscious), AED, special resuscitation situations, and other cardiopulmonary emergencies. Print the Course Completion Certificate to bring to Heartcode BCLS Online Skills Check Part 2.

ANNUAL INFLUENZA CAMPAIGN

To better protect patients, families and the community, Carolinas HealthCare System and Carolinas College of Health Sciences are committed to helping you stay safe and healthy. All students enrolled in a clinical program must receive a flu vaccination, whether through CHS or an outside provider. Students who do not receive the vaccination must submit a proper exemption form. The 2016-2017 campaign runs **October 2 - November 17**.

This year's flu campaign has the same policy as last year:

- 1. Flu vaccinations are mandatory, but exemptions will be offered to students who submit medical or religious exemption documentation.
- 2. If you submitted religious documentation last year, you do not have to send in another form. Please let the Sharran Penny, CCHS Flu Campaign Leader (704.355.9142, room 154) know that it is still in effect.
- Students enrolled in a clinical program will be expected to receive the vaccination or submit an exemption form. Failure to receive the flu vaccine or submit the exemption form by November 17, 2017, will lead to a loss of clinical access at Carolinas HealthCare System and the end of enrollment with CCHS.
- 4. Students, staff who do not receive the vaccination or submit an exemption form will be considered non-compliant.

Where to get vaccinated:

To receive the vaccination, you may visit any CHS Teammate Health office during office hours or visit other locations on the CMC campus offering flu vaccinations. To find other CHS locations, dates and times, see the bulletin board outside of the second door of the nursing lab (room 154). The vaccine will also be available at the College on the following dates, times, and rooms:

Medical Laboratory Science (MLS) students assisted in hurricane relief efforts at the Second Harvest Food Bank. Students spent two hours creating food and care packages to deliver to shelters in both Texas and Florida for victims of the devastating effects of Hurricanes Harvey and Irma. These students have a rigorous classroom and clinical schedule but value the importance of community service in their professional development and were eager to get involved and help.

WHAT IS PULSE WEEKEND AND WHY SHOULD YOU CARE?

Interprofessional education is the latest big thing in healthcare education. It's based on the premise that care is best delivered by a high functioning team of professionals - professionals who understand one another's roles and the strengths and skills they bring to the team. Providers have done a pretty bad job of that in the past. Both in school and in practice, they know their own role, but beyond that, a lot is left up to trust and assumptions.

Carolinas College is part of a move to change that, and the PULSE Weekend is one initiative. PULSE weekend pairs a nursing or allied health student with a UNC medical student who's part of the Charlotte cohort. They start in the emergency department on Friday evening, where they select a patient to follow for the weekend. Up until hospital admission Friday night, they observe the care the patient receives from all providers, the tests run and lab values determined. They watch the hand offs and the way the family and patient are treated and educated. They do not provide care. They

return on Saturday and Sunday mornings to observe physician/care team rounds. They then attend a debrief the following week to process and share with administrators and faculty what they saw and learned. Process improvements often occur as a result, but always the students emerge from the weekend with a new understanding of the roles of the various providers.

Carolinas College had two program students complete a PULSE weekend recently. Amber Murray (NUR101) and Maryam Zoabi (HTL). Said Maryam, "My PULSE experience was humbling in that I was continuously reminded how selfless and caring a healthcare professional should be, and that success is defined by the quality of care. I gathered many valuable moments that I will carry with me throughout my career and I will always appreciate the various roles of professionals
