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Residency Program Updates: Global Health

This past February, one of our PGY-2 residents, Dr. Joanna Young, was the first recipient of a GO to GROW Scholarship sponsored by the financial planning group Spaugh, Dameron, and Tenny. This scholarship allowed Joanna to travel to Diriomo, Nicaragua with the non-profit organization Bless Back Worldwide for a short term medical mission trip. Prior to this trip, Joanna had served internationally in Honduras, El Salvador, and the Dominican Republic. Joanna provides this testimony of her most recent international experience...

I served as the sole physician on the team, and I was accompanied by nine physician assistants and two nurses. For two half-days, we had the support of a Nicaraguan physician to guide us on local infections, resistance patterns, emerging infectious diseases, and how to effectively navigate the Nicaraguan health system. I spent six days in Nicaragua doing a variety of medical tasks including clinics, home visits, and education. We held formal clinics for 3.5 days there and over 400 patients were seen. We had the unique ability to petition for continued follow-up care with extra funds from the cost of our trip, which was facilitated by the local organization, Los Rayos de Esperanza. Los Rayos maintains a year-round clinic run by a Nicaraguan nurse under the supervision of an American physician assistant in our absence.

While there were many memorable cases throughout the week, one stands out to me for its severity and prompt resolution. Early in the week, we saw a gentleman who had suffered a spinal cord injury leading to paraplegia and the need for an indwelling foley catheter. He presented as a walk-in to our clinic complaining of abnormal drainage, and two urocutaneous fistulas were identified. With the help of our organization and several Nicaraguan physicians, he was able to establish with an in-country urologist within the week and have a suprapubic catheter placed. We visited many patients who were home bound, driving as far as the roads would take us and then hiking in further. This was a new and incredibly rewarding experience for me. We also had the opportunity to teach for a day at a nursing school in Masaya, Nicaragua where we covered topics such as diabetes, sexually transmitted infections, ovulation and birth control, wound care, casting, and heart failure. The brisk question and answer session following the lectures highlighted the students' eagerness to learn. We also had the privilege of training local community health advocates on diabetes and wound care, a critical need for the community.

Looking back on the experience, if I had to choose one central theme of the trip it would be education. Even though we dispensed antibiotics, antifungals, vitamins, and medications for chronic disease, education is the one thing that will continue in our team's absence. I am grateful for this opportunity to immerse myself in a different culture and find constructive and sustainable ways to make a lasting difference.

Since returning from Nicaragua, Joanna continues to volunteer at the Charlotte Rescue Mission Rebound Clinic. Joanna says that she is "passionate about not just helping people get the healthcare they need but also the education to help avoid illness, injury, or disease going forward." She hopes to pursue fellowship training in hematology-oncology following her residency.



Residency Program Updates: ABIM Exam Milestone

This past fall, we learned that each member of our Internal Medicine Class of 2017 passed the ABIM exam on their first attempt. **This marks 10 consecutive years that our program has had a 100% ABIM exam first-time pass rate!** This extraordinary decade-long accomplishment is a testament to our residents' hard work, our faculty's dedication to exceptional mentorship and instruction, and our institution's commitment to providing a superb training environment. As far as we know, we are 1 of only 2 Internal Medicine Residency Programs nationally (out of over 500 IM programs) to hold a 100% ABIM exam program pass rate for this length of time!




