JUST RELEASED: INSTRUCTIONS FOR COMPLETING THE 2015 REQUIRED ACE MODULES

The 2015 Annual Compliance Education (ACE) program has recently been opened. The ACE program is a series of learning modules created to demonstrate that teammates and students within Carolinas HealthCare System meet compliance requirements. Each year, all students in clinical programs are required to complete the ACE modules that are most relevant for their program of study. A program representative will soon provide students with information on how and when to access ACE modules for 2015.

FACILITIES UPDATE

Exciting changes are happening in the nursing skills lab. Due to an increase in enrollment in the nurse aide program, several stations in the skills lab have been redesigned for their specific use. In order to do this effectively and to provide adequate space for teaching, the first three stations have been expanded by moving the curtains and increasing the square footage of each station. This change allowed the college to meet the requirements of the NC Division of Health Service Regulation (DHSR).

In addition, Noelle, a high-fidelity birthing manikin donated by Carolinas Simulation Center, is now available for use in the skills lab. Noelle can breathe, has pulses, can deliver a full-term baby, and is equipped with a monitor to display her vital signs making her an extremely valuable resource for practicing labor and delivery skills. Noelle can also be utilized by all college programs as a full body assessment manikin.

Sharran Penny, the learning resource specialist, will move into the large space previously used for storage. This space has the appropriate HVAC and was originally designed as a small classroom, making it the perfect space for a shared office and storage space. Renovations should be completed by the end of August. Stop by and check it out!

FUNMI SEIZES OPPORTUNITIES!

Funmi Adewale (Medical Lab Science student) believes in taking advantage of opportunities which come knocking on her door! In July, Funmi responded to Dr. Sheppard's invitation to join a small audience with Dr. John Santopietro, chief medical officer and strategist for behavioral health at Carolinas HealthCare System. Funmi jumped at the chance to spend Saturday morning with the renowned Dr. Santopietro. Educated at Yale, Harvard, and Northwestern, Dr. Santopietro was recruited to join CHS shortly after he led the community grief and trauma counseling effort for residents of Sandy Hook, NJ, after the tragic school shootings there. Though she gave up her Saturday morning to attend, afterward she enthusiastically commented, "What an amazing opportunity!"

THEY'RE BACK FROM BELIZE!

The college's first international elective ended on August 1, and all students returned to Charlotte safely and with a new appreciation for the tiny nation of Belize! The two-week nursing class, "Transcultural Nursing with Cardiac Focus," combined an international travel opportunity in Central America with an opportunity to practice clinical nursing skills, and to study the five different cultures in Belize. Belize was part of British Honduras until fairly recently so English is the first language spoken. And because Carolinas HealthCare System has been expanding the resources available to Belize City's Karl Huesner Memorial Hospital through gifts and training, CCHS students were greeted warmly. Accompanied by faculty member Dr. Susan Patterson, alumnus Alan Tobias, and CHS Pineville nurse educator Lisa Foster, the eight CCHS students spent a busy 14 days learning, working, laughing, and expanding their cultural and healthcare horizons. They shadowed Belize nurses and physicians as well as a CMC-based cardiovascular interventionist in Belize "on loan" from Charlotte. Students assisted at a community free clinic; climbed ancient Mayan temples; snorkeled among manatees, nurse sharks, eels, and fishes of the world's 2nd largest coral reef. They befriended a spider monkey, spent a day at a center for disabled youth, and another at a center for health restoration. As a capstone, they participated in "The Heart of Belize" a community outreach/assessment clinic at which over 100 Belizeans were seen. More than 50% of "Heart's" participants were referred for follow up due to cardiac anomalies uncovered. The eight students impressed everyone with their enthusiasm, care, commitment, and nursing knowledge, making this the first of more to come!

CULTURAL & RELIGIOUS DIVERSITY: Understanding and respecting others' beliefs.

Charlotte's increasing diversity is reflected in the patients we serve. A culturally competent provider knows that religious beliefs can bring comfort to patients dealing with illness, pain and stress. Listed below are some of the current month's days of cultural and spiritual significance.

August 1 *Kamál – Bahá’í*. The beginning of the eighth month of the Bahá’í year, meaning “perfection.” Lughnassadh [Lammas] – Wicca The harvest of first fruits, celebrating the harvest of corn and wheat. Wiccan practitioners see this time as a signal of the god Lugh’s decline of strength as the sun rises farther south each day, while the Goddess witnesses this season with sorrow and joy. It is both a somber and celebratory feast day.

August 6 *Feast of the Transfiguration – Christianity (Western and Eastern churches)*. Celebrates the manifestation of Jesus' divinity as God's Son to his disciples Peter, James, and John on Mount Tabor.

August 15 *Assumption of the Virgin Mary – Christianity [Catholic churches]*. According to the Catholic Church, this day commemorates how, at the end of her life, Jesus' mother Mary was assumed—body and soul—into heaven, where she intercedes for all believers.

Dormition of the Theotokos or Most Holy Mother of God – Christianity [Orthodox churches]. According to the Orthodox Church, this day marks Mary's death and resurrection by God, as a sign to all believers of their ultimate destiny.

August 18 *Nowruz – Zoroastrianism*. The start of the New Year for Zoroastrians who follow the Shenshai calendar, beginning the year.

August 23 *Khordad Sal – Zoroastrianism*. The birth anniversary of the prophet Zarathustra (Zoroaster), according to the Shenshai calendar.

August 26 *Festival of Ksitigarbha (Jizō) Bodhisattva – Buddhism*. Celebrating Ksitigarbha (Jizō) Bodhisattva, the savior of beings who suffer in the hellish realms, as well as the guardian of expectant mothers, travelers, and deceased children in Japanese culture.

August 29 *Narali Purnima or Rakhi or Raksha Bandhan – Hinduism*. Celebrating the end of monsoon season, marked by throwing coconuts to Varuna, the sea god. During this festival, girls and women tie amulets on their brothers' wrists for protection against evil.
