SHEPPARD RECOGNIZED AS ONE OF 50 MOST INFLUENTIAL WOMEN

Charlotte, NC – Dr. Ellen Sheppard, President of Carolinas College of Health Sciences, has been named by *Mecklenburg Times* as one of the area's **50 Most Influential Women.** Recipients were honored at a formal gala on May 29, 2015. The honorees represent the most influential women in business, government, education, and not-for-profit fields that live and work in the Charlotte metro area. A panel of independent business leaders choose honorees based on their professional accomplishments, as well as their involvement in the community. Recently, Sheppard was also recognized by the Charlotte Business Journal as one of Charlottes Top 25 Women in Business.

Sheppard is being recognized for her many professional accomplishments and for the role she plays in educating future healthcare providers. Since Sheppard has been with Carolinas College of Health Sciences (CCHS), part of Carolinas HealthCare System, the school has grown from a small, single-purpose nursing school, to a fully accredited, multi-program college preparing providers to enter nearly a dozen healthcare fields. Twice in the last five years, under Sheppard's leadership, CCHS has been recognized as the Number One two year college in America. Said Sheppard, when notified of the award bestowed by *Mecklenburg Times*, "I am so honored by this recognition, but want to give credit where it is due. Whatever success I've had and recognition I've earned is due to the amazing students, staff, and faculty at Carolinas College, and the amazing support provided by Carolinas HealthCare System. Students come to CCHS extraordinarily motivated to join the healthcare workforce. My job is an easy one: pairing smart, eager students with highly skilled faculty, within an environment that places patients at the center of all that we do and all that we teach.
