

COMPUTER-BASED TESTING CONTINUES TO GROW AT CAROLINAS COLLEGE

Many certification and licensure exams are offered in online formats. To better prepare students for these high-stakes tests, several programs at the college have begun to use computerized and/or online tests in specific courses. In addition, several programs require other standardized testing that is completed in an online format (for example, the TEAS or CAP tests in nursing or the PAE in surg technology). If you are testing online for the first time, here are a few quick tips for success:

So Know the rules up front to reduce surprises. Ask:

- What is the time limit?
- Can I go back and change my answers later?
- Can I skip questions and return to them later?
- Can I save the test and return to it later?
- Is scratch paper allowed?
- Practice testing with a timer in front of you. While having a clock in the classroom is a reminder of testing time, it is not the same as having a timer constantly present on the same test.



the same as having a timer constantly present on the computer screen while you are testing.

- Keep track of time, because it can be easier to rush through testing online. Pay particular attention to how many questions are on the test. If possible, prior to test, develop a timing strategy. For example, if you know there are 100 questions on the exam and you have 90 minutes to complete the exam, you should spend an average of less than a minute on each individual question. If you know that you cannot go back and change answers later, that time per question should include reviewing the question and your choice.
- If technical problems arise, immediately notify the proctor. Technology can and will fail, so be sure to communicate with your proctor if problems occur.
- Some courses may provide either paper or a white board on which to jot notes.
- Don't forget established test-taking strategies. While the test-taking delivery method has changed, many strategies that have been effective for you in the past still apply.

To ensure the integrity of these exams, most will be offered in a proctored environment in the computer lab and/or annex. Depending on the size of the class, this will periodically necessitate the temporary closure of the computer lab and/or annex. During those periods, students will have access to a temporary computer lab set up in Room 151 as well as continued access to computer resources in the AHEC Library. For student planning purposes, lab closure days will be published in the student newsletter each month, as listed below for the month of February.

STUDENT PARKING

To manage the large volume of cars on the Carolinas Medical Center (CMC) campus, everyone has a designated parking lot. When everyone uses their assigned lot, things go smoothly. As part of the CHS family, its important for students to adhere to the plan. All students are assigned to park in the "T" deck (Morehead Medical Plaza), at the corner of Kenilworth and Morehead. Students may enter and park in the "staff" section 24 hours a day, on both class and clinical days. The deck is ID badge access-controlled. After 3:00 p.m. and on weekends students also have badge access to the V lot (next to the college). Parking along Garden Ter-

race, Lombardy Circle, and illegal parking in the circle in front of the college may lead to cars being ticketed or booted by Charlotte-Mecklenburg Police. In addition, parking in a lot or parking space other than the "T" Deck may lead to ticketing or booting by CHS Security personnel, and being fined by the college. Continued violation of the parking policy may lead to disciplinary action.

HOW CAN I GET THERE FROM HERE?

While convenience often outweighs common sense, in deference to Robert Frost, sometimes the path not taken does make all the difference. Students continue to walk down the hill behind the college from Lombardy Circle at high risk of personal injury – in fact, we did have a student break her ankle recently walking down the hill. In addition, this path takes one through private property and residents continue to share their concern for the amount of student traffic on Lombardy. For those students who live in CHS housing or who walk to the college from this area, don't walk through private property and don't take the alpine slalom route down the hill. The appropriate route is the sidewalk along Garden Terrace and Loop Road. While that may take a little longer, it is safer and allows the college to continue to maintain good relations with the residents of Dilworth.

COMPLIANCE CORNER - Central Venous Catheter (CVC)

Keeping up with changing clinical practice policies is important for all healthcare providers. This month's Corner spotlights the newest protocol concerning central venous catheter care (CVC lines include subclavian, jugular and femoral access lines), and the new flushing protocol.

Prior to each use, blood return should be verified and if no blood return is found, the provider should be notified and the attempt to flush discontinued. Positive displacement devices must be attached to each port. When flushing a line, employ a push – pause method with the pressure of a 10 ml syringe.

Intermittent flush of 10 mL 0.9% NS should be used prior to each use of the line and before, between and after medication administration. A flush 20 mL of 0.9% NS should be used any time blood is withdrawn or administered. Maintenance flushes should be used with the ports that are not in use and the protocol requires 10mL of 0.9% NS every 12 hours. Review of adult central line guidelines can be found in the CHS Policy and Clinical Practice Guidelines available through PeopleConnect. (Ask Kisha how!)

WEAR RED on FEBRUARY 10: IT'S HEART HEALTHY MONTH



February 10 - All staff and students are encouraged to wear **RED** to celebrate the American Heart Association's National Wear Red Day. Heart disease is the leading cause of death in the United States. Some of the factors that put you at risk for heart disease can't be controlled, but other factors are easily controllable. Practice these heart-healthy behaviors to reduce your risk of heart disease:

- Section Exercise for 30 minutes per day, most days of the week.
- Reduce stress.
- So Limit fat, sodium, sugar, and caffeine.
- Maintain healthy weight, cholesterol and blood pressure levels.
- If you smoke QUIT!
- Solution Visit your primary care physician for regular check-ups.

Make healthy food choices.

- The 2015 1098-T tax forms were mailed to students on January 25 from a third-party vendor in CA. Students may also access this information in SONIS as of January 25. The form is available in SONIS in the top right area of the student SONIS screen. Business office staff do not offer tax advice or assistance on the deduction. Continuing education classes are ineligible for education tax deductions.
- Searching Financial aid refund checks and CHS Loan promissory notes for Spring 2016 are available to pick up/sign in the business office (room 208) until February 19. Students must show their student ID badge.

NC Forgivable Education Loan for Service (FELS). Applications are now available at https://www.cfnc.org/Gateway? command=GetBasedProgramDetail¬e=yes&type=8&vocType=11&vocational=no&id=159. Students who are North Carolina residents and will be enrolled during the 2016-17 school year in either clinical laboratory sciences, radiologic technology or nursing are encouraged to check out the information and consider applying. Note: You do not have to be admitted to the program when you apply, but you must be admitted prior to receiving funding, if selected. **Application Deadline:** The deadline is **April 1**. Applications will be reviewed on a first-come, first-served basis.

- Read your notes out loud.
- So Record yourself reciting the material and listen while walking or on the elliptical.
- Secopy main points from your notes in a format your prefer.
- So Brainstorm ways to apply the information.
- Section 2015 Se using the Cornell Note-taking System (see the Student Success Center page on the Information Portal).
- Section Teach the information to a friend.
- Create visuals/mind maps on a white board or other large surface.

A BELIZE EXPERIENCE: CCHS's International Experience for Nursing Students

You might be a candidate for one of the eight spaces available in CCHS's 2016 Summer Transcultural Nursing Experience if you like.....

- Spending two weeks in Belize, the only Central American country where English is the official language.
- Observing nursing and medical care in an underserved nation.
- Helping organize and conduct Belize's second "Heart of Belize" community assessment event.
- Exploring the medical and social needs of Belizeans' five primary cultural groups.
- Being in a tourist mecca <u>after</u> the cruise ships leave!
- Optional outings to the world's best snorkeling, the Belize Zoo, or a Mayan ruin.

In partnership with Carolinas HealthCare System's Department of International Medicine, CCHS is proud to again present an international experience for students. In July, RN faculty accompany the small group to Belize City, but excursions take us to Belizean villages as well. At our partner hospital Karl Heusner Memorial, and at community clinics, CCHS students observe care, round with faculty, and explore the population health effects of poverty, poor nutrition, and lack of access to effective medical care.



Requirements: Completed NUR 101; current passport valid through August 2016; current immunizations.

Cost: Standard tuition for a three-credit nursing course (\$975) plus \$915 international travel fee. No textbook required, no lab or technology fees..

What's Included? Round trip airfare on U.S. airline; all meals while at the hospital (breakfast and lunch); shared room in a USstyle hotel. Daily transportation to and from KHMH and clinics, and to and from airport, farewell dinner.

Not Included: Passport, most dinners, incidentals, weekend optional excursions (nearby are an exceptional zoo; Laminai, a remarkable Mayan ruin; and world class snorkeling at Ambergris or Caulker Caye).

CULTURAL & RELIGIOUS DIVERSITY: Understanding and Respecting Others' Beliefs.

Charlotte's increasing diversity is reflected in the patients we serve. A culturally competent provider knows that religious beliefs can bring comfort to patients dealing with illness, pain and stress. Listed below are some of the current month's days of cultural and spiritual significance.

February 2. *Presentation of Jesus in the Temple – Christianity.* Commemorates Mary and Joseph's presentation of the child Jesus at the Temple in Jerusalem, as required by Mosaic law.

February 7. Four Chaplains Sunday – Interfaith. A commemoration of four U.S. Army chaplains - Rabbi Alexander D. Goode, Rev. George L. Fox, Fr. John P. Washington, and Rev. Clark V. Poling—who died while saving soldiers from drowning when their troop transport ship, the U.S.A.T. Dorchester, was torpedoed by a Nazi U-boat in 1943. The four chaplains are remembered for their courage and their spirit of interfaith collaboration in service to humanity.

February 8. *Chinese/Vietnamese/Korean New Year – Buddhism/Confucianism/Taoism.* The first day after the new moon is a religious and cultural festival for Korean, Vietnamese, and Chinese persons, marking the first day of the year 4714, the Year of the Monkey.

February 9. Losar [Tibetan New Year] – Buddhism. Celebrating the beginning of the year 2143 in the Tibetan calendar.

February 10. Ash Wednesday – Christianity (Western churches). The beginning of Lent, a 40-day period (excluding Sundays) in which Christians pray, repent, fast and reflect on Jesus' final journey to Jerusalem. It is a preparatory period for Holy Week and Easter; on this day, believers often receive an ashen cross on their foreheads to mark their repentance and mortality.

February 12. Vasanta Panchami – Hinduism. A North Indian celebration associated with Saraswati, the goddess of learning, and with Lakshmi, the goddess of wealth.

February 14. *Valentine's Day – Western Christianity*. A celebration of love originally connected to the Roman Christian martyr who died in 269 C.E.

February 15. *Nirvana Day – Buddhism*. In northern Buddhist traditions, this day marks the anniversary of the historical Buddha's death in ca. 486 B.C.E. and his subsequent entrance into enlightenment or Nirvana. In southern Buddhist traditions, the Buddha's death is commemorated during Visakha.

February 25. *Ayyám-i-Há – Bahá'í [through February 29].* Starting at sundown, this festival marks the beginning of the intercalary days for festivities, gift giving, and charitable actions.
