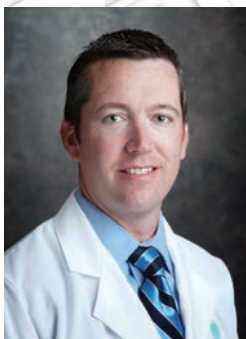

Kevin J.E. Stepp, MD, is the Director of Advanced Surgical Specialties for Women, Chief of Urogynecology and Minimally Invasive Gynecologic Surgery and Co-Director of Women's Center for Pelvic Health. After completing his residency in Obstetrics and Gynecology at MetroHealth/Cleveland Clinic in Cleveland, Ohio, he completed a three-year combined fellowship in Minimally Invasive Surgery and Urogynecology/Pelvic Reconstructive Surgery at the Cleveland Clinic in Cleveland, Ohio. After his fellowship, he returned to MetroHealth Medical Center where he was Director of Gynecologic Surgical Education and founded a fellowship in Urogynecology and Minimally Invasive Surgery.

Dr. Stepp is a pioneer in advanced gynecologic surgery and robotics. He was awarded 2011 Surgeon of the Year by Surgical Products Magazine for his work on innovative surgical technologies. Dr. Stepp is one of only a handful of surgeons in the world currently performing single port laparoscopy for complex conditions such as severe endometriosis, large fibroids and reconstruction.

He is board certified and a Fellow of the American College of Obstetrics and Gynecology. He speaks internationally and has trained over 500 physicians from 23 countries.

Dr. Stepp is currently accepting patients for urinary and fecal incontinence, prolapse, complications and reconstructive surgery, as well as, minimally invasive treatments for fibroids, endometriosis, ovarian cysts and other complicated benign gynecologic conditions.
