Software Requirements:

- 1. Internet connection: Since most content is data intensive; cable or DSL connection is required.
- 2. Edvance360 is currently compatible with Internet Explorer 7 or later versions and Firefox 1.0 or later versions. Other browsers may be

- used, but may not support all functionality in Edvance360. We recommend that you remain updated with the latest versions of web browser software that you use.
- 3. All browsers should support JavaScript and have JavaScript enabled.
- 4. Operating system: online platform independent (Windows XP or Apple's most current operating system minimum suggestion).
- 5. Microsoft Office 2007 or higher required.
- 6. Other Software: antivirus, Adobe Reader 9 or higher, WinZip, Media Player software, Apple's Quick time, Skype (required).
- Students are required to keep their personal computers up to date with the latest Microsoft Window's updates, virus data files, etc. The College is not responsible for maintaining students' personal computers.

BSN Completion Degree Curriculum Plan

The Bachelor of Science in Nursing degree will be awarded to students who successfully complete a minimum of (122) hours of course work. In this baccalaureate completion program, up to sixty- one (61) credit hours are awarded for successful completion of an associate degree or diploma program in nursing which includes courses in the nursing major and general education. The completion program requires an additional 21 credit hours in general education and elective courses, and 40 credit hours in upper level nursing and major courses for a minimum of 122 credit hours. All nursing (NSG) courses are designed to be completed in a five-week period.

Students are strongly encouraged to enroll in the following courses prior to enrolling in the Nursing Course Sequence outlined below:

- BUS 310 Introduction to Financial Management**
- MAT 201 Introductory Statistics*
- ENG 302 Professional Research and Reporting*
- SOC 313 Diversity

Completion of the aforementioned courses will be required for graduation. Students who do not complete the aforementioned courses prior to starting the Nursing Course Sequence must meet with the advisor to create a plan for adding these courses into the student's curriculum plan.

RN-BSN Program

Policies and Procedures

The College Catalog and College Handbook are the primary sources of information for policies and procedures that apply to students, faculty and staff.

Prior Experiences and/or Certification and Academic Credit

Earning credits based on experiences and/or certification is governed by the Extra Institutional Credit policy of the College (see College Catalog).

BSN students may challenge by examination theory courses but concurrent clinical courses are exempt from credit by examination.

Collaborative Clinical Experience Dress Code

Students are expected to dress in a professional manner when conducting College/Course related business in clinical agencies. Professional attire includes a clean, unwrinkled lab coat with school insignia on the left sleeve and student ID badge. No form of denim or tennis shoes should be worn in the clinical setting or at CMC-NorthEast. Business Casual is expected.

Students should become familiar with the dress policy of their assigned agencies and must follow stated agency policies. Violations of dress policies may represent a breach of agency contract with Cabarrus College and may result in termination of assigned clinical experience.

Clinical Travel

A variety of organizations and clinical agencies are used to meet program goals and objectives. Students are expected to provide their own transportation for all courses. No reimbursement will be given for mileage or expenses incurred.

Health Information

Students must meet all health and immunization requirements of Cabarrus College and assigned health agencies. That includes up-to-date immunizations, tuberculin control measures (test and/or chest x-ray), Hepatitis B vaccine (or signed declination form), drug screen, and cardiopulmonary resuscitation certification. All health information must be accurate and remain current during the academic year.

RN Licensure

RN licensure is an admission requirement and is mandatory throughout enrollment in the BSN completion program. The RN license must be current, unencumbered in NC or a COMPACT state throughout the academic year. Any change in RN licensure status must be reported to the Program Chair immediately.

Written Assignments

The American Psychological Association (APA) is the style approved for written assignments for CCHS students. All written assignments must follow APA guidelines for cover or face page, headings, citations, serialization, listing, margins, references, etc. Students are encouraged to use online sources of information about APA style but are cautioned to use resources that are based on the most <u>current edition</u> of APA.

ATTENDANCE

The Cabarrus College faculty expect students to consistently attend and participate in all academic courses in which they are registered. Attendance refers to all required on-campus classes, laboratory sessions, clinical/fieldwork and related experiences, as well as active participation in distance education activities as

outlined in the course syllabi. Absences interfere with the student receiving the full benefit of the educational experience and therefore should only occur in emergency situations such as personal illness, family illness, or death of a close family member. In order to meet academic attendance expectations, all students must have access to the internet, a telephone, Cabarrus College email, the Learning Management System email, and as applicable, transportation services. All students are expected to keep their contact information up to date in Sonis and check their College email account, personal phone, and the College website for announcements concerning College closings, delays or rescheduling due to inclement weather, faculty absences, facility closing or other emergencies impacting student attendance. Students who stop attending a course should officially drop the course or be subject to involuntary withdrawal by the instructor. For additional information, please refer to the Withdrawal section.

E-mail Correspondence Statement:

Email is a valuable communication tool for issues in this course associated with information and notifications (schedule changes, making appointments, notification of assignments, etc.). When there is a need to resolve differences regarding performance evaluation, grading, or other academic issues communication should be via a scheduled meeting between the faculty and student.

As a general rule, the instructor will respond to student communications within 48 hours.

- Check your email for important information for other departments in the college.
- Communicate with your course faculty and advisor. Don't disappear in cyber land. We care about you and your success.

General Information

- Students are expected to use the syllabus, course calendar and guidelines throughout the semester and to refer to this information when raising questions or clarifying assignments.
- Major papers and other class assignments must be typewritten and prepared according to acceptable collegiate standards and APA guidelines.
 Assignments will be evaluated based on APA guidelines.
- Assignments submitted after the due date will automatically lose 10 points per day, any assignment submitted later than 3 days after the due date will receive a 0 for the assignment.
- In the event a student is unable to meet a scheduled due date because of
 circumstances beyond their control the student may request an extension
 for a specific assignment. Extensions are granted by the faculty on a caseby-case basis, all extensions must be requested *prior* to the due date.
 Work schedule/changes, internet access issues, and computer issues will
 not be considered as circumstances beyond your control.
- All exams, quizzes and assignments will be graded as soon as reasonably possible. Exams, quizzes and assignments are brought to the discussion sessions for your review. Any grading issues must be resolved at that time. Once you leave the discussion session, the score on the exam, quiz or assignment is final and will no longer be available for review. All papers submitted for grades are retained by Cabarrus College and must be returned after review of faculty comments.
- Please keep a back-up copy of all work/emails/papers while in the program.
- No recording of lectures or classes unless approved by the nursing faculty.
