






CCHS ALUMNI HELD UP AS SYSTEMWIDE EXAMPLE

FINANCIAL AID UPDATES

- FAFSA DAY is Saturday February 28. FAFSA DAY is a free service provided by the College Foundation of North Carolina, the North Carolina Association of Student Financial Aid Administrators and the State Employees' Credit Union. Visit CFNC.org/FAFSAday or call toll free 866-866-CFNC for information or to register for a location near you. The event will be held at locations in every North Carolina county.
- The Forgivable Education Loans for Service Program (FELS) provides financial assistance to qualified students enrolled in an approved education program and committed to working in critical employment shortage professions in North Carolina. For the 2015 - 16 academic year, eligible programs of study offered at CCHS include Clinical Laboratory Sciences, Radiology and Nursing.
- The FELS application is available online through the CFNC.org/FELS page. The deadline for FELS applicants is April 1, 2015. The application must be submitted on or before the deadline date. All supporting documentation to the application (transcripts, acceptance letters, etc.) must be postmarked by the deadline as well.



- The 2015-16 CCHS Scholarship application will be sent to currently enrolled students by email with a link to the application on February 9. Paper applications will also be available in the financial aid office beginning on the same date. Application deadline is April 1, 2015.
- Applications for the 2015 Charles Mauney Scholarship are now available for eligible enrolled MLS students. Completed applications must be returned to the Carolinas College Financial Aid Office no later than February 13. To be eligible for consideration, applicants must also have a completed 2014-2015 FAFSA on file with the financial aid office.

- Financial aid refund checks for spring 2015 will be available beginning at 10 a.m. on **February 3**. Students must present their CCHS student ID badge to pick up checks.

STUDENT PARKING

To manage the large volume of cars on the Carolinas Medical Center (CMC) campus, everyone has a designated parking lot. When everyone uses their assigned lot, things go smoothly. As part of the CHS family, its important for students to adhere to the plan. All students are assigned to park in the Morehead Medical Plaza (MMP) deck, at the corner of Kenilworth and Morehead. Students enter and park in the "staff" section 24 hours a day, on both class and clinical days. The deck is ID badge access-controlled. After 3:00 p.m. and on weekends students also have badge access to the V lot (next to the College). Parking along Garden Terrace and Lombardy Circle may lead to cars being ticketed or booted by Charlotte-Mecklenburg Police. Parking in a lot other than the MMP Deck may lead ticketing or booting by CHS Security personnel, and being fined by the College. Continued violation of the parking policy may lead to disciplinary action.

COMPLIANCE CORNER - 2015 National Patient Safety Goals

With the new semester comes new clinical assignments - what better time to highlight safety goals? The Joint Commission (TJC) is a non-profit organization that continuously strives to improve healthcare for the public by evaluating healthcare organizations against strict standards for safe and effective, quality patient care. Each January TJC issues its National Patient Safety Goals for the year. Some goals remain on the list each year because they are so fundamentally important. Key goals this year include:

- Improve accurate patient identification.
- Improve effectiveness of communication among caregivers.
- Improve safe medication use.
- Reduce harm through clinical alarm systems.
- Reduce the risk of healthcare-associated infections.
- Identify patient safety risks.
- Prevent mistakes in surgery.

All healthcare workers need to comply with efforts to meet these goals.

REQUIRED STUDENT TRAINING: SEXUAL HARASSMENT AND VIOLENCE

Beginning in 2015, students are required to complete an online training program regarding sexual harassment and sexual violence.

The Consent & Respect Training module is a brief online course that provides college students with facts about sexual assault, consent, intimate partner violence and stalking, warning signs of abusive behavior, the role of men as advocates, and safe and positive options that will empower bystanders in potential high-risk situations.

This training is the direct result of new federal policy designed to assure America's college campuses provide a safe culture for women. Carolinas College has embraced the new requirement, reflecting its own deep commitment to providing a safe and welcoming environment for all students. The Title IX Awareness and Violence Prevention online educational course is part of this commitment and complies with federal guidance and legislation that continues to evolve.

Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972 is a federal civil rights law that prohibits discrimination on the basis of sex in education programs and activities. All colleges and universities receiving any federal funds must comply with Title IX. Under Title IX, discrimination on the basis of sex can include sexual harassment or sexual violence, such as rape, sexual assault, sexual battery and sexual coercion.

A BELIZE EXPERIENCE: CCHS's First International Experience for Students

If any or all of the points below appeal to you, you might be a candidate for CCHS's 2015 Belize Experience. Though we hope to expand the scope of the trip in future years, it is limited to nursing students in 2015.

- Earn three nursing credits (elective) in two weeks. (Some pre-work required).
- Spend two weeks in the only Central American country where English is the official language.
- Observe nursing and medical care in an underserved nation.
- Help organize and conduct Belize's first "Heart of a Champion-like" assessment event.
- Explore the medical as well as the bio-psycho-social needs of Belizeans.
- Assist in helping Belize nurses learn effective care techniques as well as management of chronic disease.
- Via telemedicine capabilities, participate in lectures streamed from CMC to Belize, and from Belize to CMC.
- Gather assessment data to be used in heart valve research.
- Be in a tourist mecca after the cruise ships leave.
- Optional weekend outings to Ambergris Caye (world's best snorkeling), the Belize Zoo, or a Mayan ruin.

In partnership with Carolinas HealthCare System's Department of International Medicine, CCHS is proud to present its first international experience for students. Two RNs will be accompanying the small group: Dr. Susan Patterson (DNP, MSN, RN, CCHS nursing faculty member) and Lisa Foster (MSN, RN, CMC-Pineville nurse educator). Our partner hospital in Belize City is KHMH (Karl Heusner Memorial Hospital). CCHS students will observe care, round with Dr. Patterson to discuss patients and care, and explore the population health effects of poverty, poor nutrition, and lack of access to high level medical care. Assist Ms. Foster with developing and delivering an educational plan geared to the needs of the nurses at KHMH. Organize and conduct a health assessment clinic designed to identify those needing additional care.

Belize City is generally very safe, though as with all travel, vigilance is recommended and you'll travel in a group.



Requirements: Must have completed NUR 101, have current passport valid through August 2015, current on required immunizations.

Cost: Standard tuition for a three-credit nursing course (\$951) plus \$650 international travel fee. No textbook required.

What's Included: Round trip air fare on U.S. airline; all meals while at the hospital (likely, breakfast and lunch daily); shared room in a nicely appointed B&B; daily transportation to and from KHMH; transportation to and from airport.

What's Not Included: Passport, dinner each day, incidentals, weekend optional excursions. (Several optional outings will be available; cost will depend on participation. Just outside Belize City is an exceptional zoo; a few hours away via a river boat is Laminai, a remarkable Mayan ruin, and you're a stone's throw from the beaches and snorkeling of Ambergris Caye.

I'm Interested....What's Next? Attend one of two available information sessions to learn more; Feb. 16, 8:15 to 8:50 a.m. (rm 161) and Feb. 23, 1:30 to 2:20 p.m. (rm 157).

Register for NUR 240...when registering for summer semester. A cash deposit toward the travel fee will be required.

Dates: Tentatively, **July 19 - 31**. (Subject to change. Final dates will be announced by **March 1, 2015**).

PAYING TRIBUTE TO THE REVEREND DR. MARTIN LUTHER KING, JR.




"History was made, and so we gather."

CCHS TST CLINIC

One benefit of attending a Carolinas HealthCare System school: Free Immunizations! TST is the Tuberculin Skin Test (TST), part of CHS's safety plan for all patients, employees, and students. An annual TST assesses likely exposure to TB, so you can get the care you need. A TST is required during your birthday month or you can opt to get the test as much as 90 days in advance of your birthday. Free TSTs are available at CCHS in the lobby on **February 16**, 11:15 to noon. Can't make it? Walk up Loop Road to the Teammate Health Office in the annex building across from the CMC Emergency Entrance. Your free TST is available there M - F, 7:30 - 4:30.


STUDENT SUCCESS CENTER

Success Tip of the Month - One of the major challenges for all students is motivation. Try changing up your review methods, making them as active as possible, to help you engage with what you are learning and retain concepts. Rather than just silently reviewing your notes over and over, try the following:

- Read out loud and listen to yourself.
- Recopy main points from your notes.
- Brainstorm ways to apply the information.
- Test yourself on your notes perhaps by using the Cornell Note-taking System (see the Student Success Center page on the information portal).
- Teach the information to a friend.
- Create visuals/mind maps on a white board or other large surface.

CULTURAL & RELIGIOUS DIVERSITY: Understanding and respecting others' beliefs.

Charlotte's increasing diversity is reflected in the patients we serve. A culturally competent provider knows that religious beliefs can bring comfort to patients dealing with illness, pain and stress. Occasionally, your CCHS Newsletter features some of the current month's days of cultural and spiritual significance.

The Iroquois Midwinter Ceremony (old fires are extinguished and new fires are lit) and the Hopi Holy Cycle (changing of the seasons and the sacred universe are celebrated) marks the approach of the new year and begins in January and February. In aboriginal spirituality, February is known as Buxwlaks (the season of blowing needles) because the wind knocks loose the frozen evergreens foliage.

- Feb. 1: Triodion begins (Christianity Eastern churches) marking the start of the ten weeks preceding Holy Pascha (Easter). Also, Four Chaplains Sunday (Interfaith) commemorates four US Army chaplains who died while saving soldiers from drowning when their ship was torpedoed by a Nazi U-boat in 1943.
- Feb. 2: Presentation of Jesus in the Temple in Jerusalem (Christianity) by Mary and Joseph, as required by Mosaic law. In Wicca tradition, it's Imbolc Feast of Torches a celebration of divine generative powers (i.e., the Goddess nurturing her young Son).
- Feb. 3: On Setsunbun-sai (Shintō) the family celebrates the end of winter, throws beans for good luck and shouts "Devil out; Fortune in!" In Judaism's Tu B'Shevat, a joyous celebration of coming spring, begins at sundown. Trees are planted and fruits native to Israel enliven special meals.
- Feb. 7: Mulk (Bahá'í) is the beginning of the 18th month of the Bahá'í year, the name "Mulk" means "dominion."
- Feb. 8: Parinirvana (Buddhism, Mahāyāna tradition) is the anniversary of the historical Buddha's death (ca. 486 B.C.E.) and his entrance into Nirvana. Other Buddhist schools mark this event on February 15th as Nirvana Day.
- Feb. 14: Valentine's Day (Western Christianity) a celebration of love honoring the Roman Christian martyr who died in 269 C.E.
- Feb. 17: Mahashivratri (Hinduism) is for worshiping Shiva, whose dance creates and destroys and recreates the world.
- Feb. 18: Ash Wednesday Christianity (Western churches) The beginning of Lent, a forty-day period (excluding Sundays) in which Christians pray, repent, fast and reflect on Jesus' final journey to Jerusalem. It is a preparatory period for Holy Week and Easter; on this day, believers often receive an ashen cross on their foreheads to mark their repentance and mortality. Also, Losar (Tibetan New Year). Buddhism. Celebrating the beginning of the year 2142 in the Tibetan calendar.
- Feb. 19: Chinese/Vietnamese/Korean New Year (Buddhism/Confucianism/Taoism). The first day after the new moon is a religious and cultural festival for Korean, Vietnamese and Chinese persons, marking the first day of the year 4713, the Year of the Sheep.
- Feb. 22: Cheesefare Sunday (Forgiveness Sunday). Christianity (Eastern churches) This feast marks the last day of eating dairy products prior to Holy Pascha (also known as Easter). The Great Fast or Great Lent begins at sundown and is marked by 40 days of vegetarian fasting, intense prayer and almsgiving in preparation for Holy Week. The following day is known as Clean Monday.
- Feb. 26: Ayyám-i-Há Bahá'í (through March 1). Starting at sundown, this festival marks the beginning of the intercalary days for festivities, gift giving, and charitable actions.
